On Front Street

One of the most haunting and timeless songs I know, whose lyrics and melody have been indelibly etched upon my heart since I was a teenager, forever and constantly remind me of the fleeting and ultimately transient nature of our lives and our ways:

*Across the evening sky, All the birds are leaving
But how can they know, It's time for them to go?
Before the winter fire, I will still be dreaming
I do not count the time . . .*

The late Sandy Denny, who wrote this elegy in 1966, spoke then as she still does now to the truth of movement and spirit, the ways in which some deep and inner essence reminds us that seasons change, life moves to a rhythm beyond the secular grasp, we pass through places and people, and in some mysterious way and at some mystical time we all become aware of transition and finitude, life's ebb and flow, our own mortality and the fleeting, precious hours which yet remain. Once we cease to "count the time", we can then lay claim to deeper truths within our relationships, our heart, our soul and our selves. We become more acutely aware of and more deeply sensitive to the wounds by which we are made whole, the confusions which have unsettled us, the love which has sustained us, the undeserved benevolence of God which redeems and comforts us, even and especially in the darkest nights of the soul.

Like St. Stephen's itself, I too am in the midst of such a season. A new Dean is imminent, my own movement nears, the soft green of a Susquehanna springtime gives way to more languid and sultry nights which, in their own way, presage yet more passage for all. Such change can either be

feared or embraced. No two persons or entities will respond in the same way. After almost 30 years "on the run", having left home when I was 17, I would, however, make this observation: Fear is the antithesis of faith, and if you or I believe in God — truly believe, in our souls and in our spirits — then we can only carry on by casting such fear utterly aside, once and for all. To operate in any climate other than hope is to diminish the Gospel, make unseemly and spiritually indefensible bargains with the Almighty, and regularly put Christ to the side as we pursue our own temporal and material ways. Such learning, the confirmation of ultimate trust in God and of the capacity of the Holy Spirit to transform and renew, comes with time and the years. A few are fortunate to receive such lessons through profound indwellings; most of us, myself included, do so over the course of a lifetime, in a variety of places, amidst unlikely and challenging circumstances, and when we least expect it. "Progressive revelation" it is sometimes called, and a priceless gift it truly is.

*So come the storms of winter
And then the birds in spring again
I do not fear the time
For who knows where the time goes?
Who knows where the time goes?¹*

May God bless and keep you always. May you always know that you are loved.

News and Events

Highlights of the Vestry Meeting on May 19, 2005

The following is a summary of the key items addressed during the Vestry meeting held on May 19, 2005. A copy of the minutes of this meeting will be posted on the Cloister Bulletin Board following their approval at the June Vestry meeting.

1. The Interim Dean and all members of Vestry expressed their sincere thanks to Anne Yellott and Canon William Murphey, as well as to those generous members of the Cathedral who contributed to the success of the Pentecost "birthday" gift-giving event. The Vestry also offered heartfelt thanks to Warren and Dorothy Gillam for their kind and generous offering of the Christian Seay Concert, with all freewill proceeds from the concert benefiting the Cathedral.
2. In anticipation of the selection of the new Dean, the Vestry authorized the Senior Warden to negotiate a compensation package with the final candidate that is not to exceed an amount set by the Vestry. Visits to Harrisburg by the finalists for the Dean's position are scheduled during the first and second weeks in June.
3. The Vestry appointed three (3) members of the Cathedral to serve as the Vestry's representatives on the St. Stephen's School Board. Those individuals are Joe Gardiner, who currently serves on the Board, for a term of one (1) year; Margaret Messner, who also currently serves on the Board, for a term of three (3) years; and Carolyn Patterson, for a term of two (2) years. The Vestry also recommended that the nominating committee of the School Board consider Helen Delano to serve as a parent representative on the Board and Ralph Gillette to serve as a community representative on the Board. Other Cathedral members currently serving on the Board include Caroline Boyce, David Dekok, Patrick Strohl and Gene McHugh. Under the terms of the newly adopted by-laws, both the Dean and the Junior Warden will serve as members of the School Board.
4. After receiving a status report on the proposed sale of the Bigler House at fair market value to members of the Cathedral, the Vestry voted to extend the offer period for another thirty (30) days, until June 30, 2005. The extension was requested to allow additional time for the Cathedral to obtain a valuation of the property.
5. The Vestry reviewed five (5) initiatives that the Vestry members had identified during the Vestry Retreat held in April. Those initiatives are (1) Evangelizing, (2) Communications/Engaging members, (3)

Finances, (4) Spirituality, and (5) Youth. Members of Vestry then volunteered to be accountable for the development of recommendations for each of these initiatives.

6. The Junior Warden reported on the Committee Planning Session that was held on May 17, 2005. During this session, the Interim Dean reviewed effective governance practices that each committee should follow. Those committee members in attendance then reviewed the mission statement, goals and objectives for each of their respective committees. Following the discussion, the Vestry agreed with the recommendation that the current Evangelism Committee be renamed as the Parish Life committee, given the nature of the ministry Ted Webber's committee currently serves. It is likely that a new Evangelism Committee will be formed as part of the Vestry initiatives identified above.

7. Two groups have expressed interest in renting some of the Cathedral's space. One group is interested in leasing the third floor of the Chapter House, and another group is interested in leasing The Uppercroft and space on the first floor of the Cathedral House for use on Sunday afternoons. The Interim Dean and the Property Chair are coordinating these efforts.

8. Vestry voted unanimously to replace 37 aging (and in some cases defective) smoke/fire detectors throughout the St. Stephen's campus.

Health Ministry "BE TICK SAVVY"

"The Cycle" Adult ticks feed and mate on large mammals, often deer, in the fall and early spring, then the females drop to the ground to lay eggs. Eggs hatch into larvae by summer. The larvae feed on mice, other small mammals and birds in summer and early fall, before becoming inactive until spring, when they molt into nymphs. Nymphs, pose the greatest threat to humans because of their active feeding and small size. Ticks obtain nutrients by feeding on the blood of warm-blooded animals called hosts. Some ticks carry disease-causing organisms ingested after biting an infected host (usually a deer or rodent). These organisms may be passed from the saliva of an infected tick to the blood of the subsequent hosts. The tick must stay attached to the host for 36-48 hours for transmission to occur.

BE AWARE OF THESE SYMPTOMS;

- ☹️ Rash "Bull's-Eye" in appearance, 2 inches or greater, lasting more than a week, center of rash often clears as the rash enlarges. Appears within 3 days to a month of a bite. This rash may not always occur.

- ☹️ Early signs of fatigue, chills, fever, headache, muscle/joint pain, swollen lymph nodes
- ☹️ Late symptoms of arthritis might appear years after the infection
- ☹️ Permanent damage to joints/nervous systems if disease is not treated in the early stages

ACTION STEPS;

- 😊 Protection is extremely important during the next few months when the tick is in the nymph stage
 - 😊 Know what a deer tick looks like
 - 😊 Avoid places where there is tall grass
 - 😊 Cover up & use repellent containing permethrin or DEET
 - 😊 Check for ticks, especially warm areas (groin, armpits, scalp)
 - 😊 Use fine-pointed tweezers to gently remove it. Grab its head as close to the skin, using a twisting motion, pull gently. Do not aggravate the tick by apply alcohol, petroleum jelly or any other substance.
 - 😊 Apply an antiseptic ointment after removal. Save the tick in plastic bag if symptoms develop

This Year's Picnic Honorees are . . .

Duryea and Patricia Cameron

Three doors south of St. Stephen's Cathedral there used to stand a beautiful townhouse at 203 North Front Street, the home of an attorney for the Pennsylvania Railroad, Lyman D. Gilbert and his wife Gabriella Cameron Gilbert. Living on occasion with the Gilberts was their nephew Brodnax Cameron of Petersburg, Virginia, Duryea Cameron's father. An attorney, educated at The Gilman School, Princeton, and the University of Virginia, Brodnax Cameron was from an old Virginia family of Scots Presbyterian stock known for the William Cameron and Brothers Company (later Courage British-American Tobacco Company) who married Julia Duryea Sprigg an Episcopalian descendant of French Huguenots who settled in Long Island and known for the Duryea Cornstarch and Smithfield Ham Companies. Born in Baltimore, Duryea Cameron moved with his family to Bel Air where his father practiced law, built their home Joshua's Meadow, and was a member of St. Mary's Episcopal Church Emmorton. Graduating from The Gilman School, Duryea entered Princeton in the summer of 1943 before volunteering to join the Tenth Mountain Infantry Division. Later becoming an investigating lieutenant, Duryea was leader of the battalion drill team composed of German POWs in Trieste, Italy.

In the summer of 1946 First Lieutenant Duryea Cameron met Patricia Anne Behrens who was living with her family at the Bainbridge U. S. Naval Training Center at Port Deposit; where her father was the commandant of the base. William Wohlsen Behrens, Pat Cameron's father, was a rear admiral in the U. S. Navy, his German ancestors the Behrens settled in New York City and the Wohlsens in Lancaster City establishing the Wohlsen Planing Mill; he married Nellie Vasey of St. Petersburg, Clarion County. Born in Newport, Rhode Island, Pat lived all around the world attending twelve schools before graduating simultaneously from the Punahou School in Honolulu, Hawaii and The Friends Select School in Philadelphia. Graduating from Bryn Mawr in 1946, Pat, as president of the undergraduate student association, lunched with Eleanor Roosevelt. Retiring his skis, in 1946 Duryea returned from Trieste, proposed marriage to Pat, and resumed his studies at Princeton, as a sophomore.

Moving to Washington, D. C. Pat went to work for the Pacific Science Council of the National Academy of Sciences. Baptized a Lutheran, Pat joined Christ Episcopal Church Georgetown and was confirmed by Bishop Angus Dunn. Eventually transferring to a position with the Navy Department, Pat concluded her days in Washington, D. C. working for the Central Intelligence Agency. In 1948 Pat's father retired from the U. S. Navy and moved to Harrisburg accepting a position in Governor James H. Duff's administration eventually joining the cabinet. In the same year, Pat returned from Washington, D. C. and temporarily lived with her parents until Duryea graduated from Princeton cum laude with a BA in architecture. Meeting with Dean Thomas Huntington Chappell at St. Stephen's, Duryea and Pat planned their wedding in the Dean's office

which would one day be Pat's office as Head of St. Stephen's School and has recently been designed by Duryea as the new clergy sacristy in memory of The Reverend Canon John Diehl. As it turned out, Dean Chappell went to New Haven for his twenty fifth class reunion at Yale and so the Camerons were married by Bishop John Thomas Heistand, incidentally on the same afternoon Margaret Masters was married at St. Stephen's.

Following a honeymoon in Nantucket, the Camerons returned to Princeton where Duryea entered graduate school and Pat worked for the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Education. Continuing his education abroad, the Camerons moved to Paris where Duryea studied at the Academie Julien earning a diplôme in art, art history, and sculpture; they purchased bicycles and traveled throughout Europe before moving to Pittsburgh where Duryea earned a second BA in structural architecture from Carnegie Mellon University. In 1952 Duryea accepted a position in Harrisburg with the firm of Clayton J. Lappley, Pat began teaching at the Harrisburg Academy, and they joined St. Stephen's Cathedral. After three years, Duryea became a registered architect and opened his own practice in the ground floor of 1327 N. Front Street designing their home on the upper levels of the house. In rapid succession the Cameron family grew to include Anne, Alex, James, and William all sharing the same middle, and of course, surname Duryea Cameron. Outgrowing the house above the offices, in 1959 the Camerons purchased their current home at 1952 High Street in Camp Hill.

One year Dean Arnold E. Mintz suggested extending the children's Sunday school program through the summer and Pat volunteered to teach, thus began Pat's ministry at St. Stephen's. Becoming an active member of the Women of St. Stephen's, Pat assumed various offices in the organization. In due time Pat was elected three times to the Vestry, twice serving as senior warden and thereby becoming the first woman in this position at St. Stephen's as well as the first woman chair of the Stewardship Committee. Chairing the Vietnamese Refugee Committee, Pat also served for twenty years on the Diocesan Racism Committee and twelve years on the Diocesan Commission on Ministry. Twice Pat has served on the Diocesan Standing Committee and the Incorporate Trustees, she has served with four Bishops and five Deans over the past fifty-three years and has won the Bishop's Shell Award, Cathedral Dean's Award, and is the only woman honorary lay canon in the Diocese.

Establishing the St. Stephen's School in 1978 has been the heart of Pat's ministry at the Cathedral and Duryea was the architect for the original school building. For many years Duryea has served on the Diocesan Building Committee and has been an architectural consultant for various parishes throughout the Diocese often working pro bono. Duryea was the architect for major projects at the parishes in Newport and Shippensburg including additions to the Episcopal Home. In 1976 Duryea chaired the sesquicentennial celebration for St. Stephen's unearthing the original cornerstone, designing, and installing the plaque above the date stone. Serving on the Building Committee at St. Stephen's Duryea has been the architect

for various building projects in the Cathedral over the years including designing the columbarium.

Still very active in the Diocese and the Cathedral Pat is a lector, serves on the Finance Committee, they both serve on the Building Committee and of course are still very involved with St. Stephen's School. This year at the annual picnic we honor Duryea and Pat Cameron for fifty-three years of selfless service and consistent commitment to the Cathedral Church of St. Stephen and the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania.

One Table, Many Voices is co-sponsored by Bread for the World, a nationwide Christian citizen's movement seeking justice for the world's hungry people and Call to Renewal, a national network of Christian churches, faith-based organizations, and individuals working to overcome poverty in America.

The conference combines Bread for the World's bi-annual National Gathering and Call to Renewal's annual Pentecost Mobilization. The four-day event will include information and training on critical issues in reducing poverty and hunger in the United States and around the world.

The conference will give you an opportunity to meet other anti-hunger/poverty advocates from around the country and world. You will be renewed and challenged in your efforts against hunger and poverty, with:

- Plenary sessions sharing the knowledge of nationally known political leaders and policy makers in the anti-poverty/hunger field. Speakers from the activist community, the religious community and the federal government will provide up-to-date information and challenge our thinking;

- A French Embassy reception to recognize the twenty-four Millennium Challenge Account eligible countries.
- An Interfaith Convocation at the Washington National Cathedral to draw attention to the scandal of hunger at home and abroad led by the leaders of thirty national faith communities.
- A Congressional Breakfast on National Hunger Awareness Day at the MCI center will kick-off our Lobby Day.
- The Amos & Joseph Awards presentation will honor leaders in advocacy for poor and hungry people.
- Workshops equipping you to become a stronger anti-hunger/poverty activist and providing insight into current poverty and hunger policies;
- And Christian worship services celebrating God's love and concern for poor and vulnerable people will be held each day.

Spring Blood Drive Revisited

In April 2005, the Parish Health Ministry informed the congregation that the Spring Annual Blood Drive had been cancelled by the Central Pennsylvania Blood Bank, because of inadequate donor response. PLEASE NOTE WELL: it is NOT our donors who are inadequate. Rather, the blood donor program is now being sustained by only 28 donors, whereas, the program was supported by almost 60 donors, just 4 years ago. The commitment of our current donors is nothing short of EXEMPLARY. Our donors have all established their own donation arrangements and schedules. These individual plans often do not allow donation at the time of the Annual Blood Drive. Therefore, future Annual Blood Drives are again being suspended by the Health Ministry.

The parish will continue to be updated on the status of the blood donor program every 2 -3 months, but not less often than quarterly. These updates will appear in the Sunday bulletins and in the Messenger. Donor locations will be published with the June update. All donors, established, or those still contemplating becoming part of the donor program, should continue to have their blood donations credited to St. Stephen's Cathedral. Thank you.

Recipe: Ginger Ale Salad

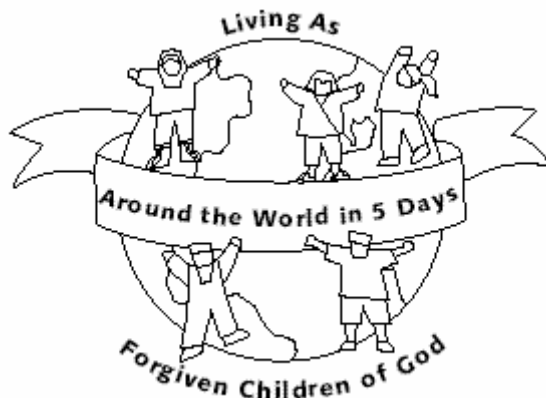
Parish Health Ministry: In response to the many requests for the Ginger Ale Salad recipe served at the luncheon, here it is. If you missed the luncheon, you missed delicious food and great entertainment.

Ginger Ale Salad

Dissolve	2 tbsp. Knox Gelatin in 4 tbsp cold water
Add	1 cup hot water-stir well
Add	½ cup sugar and juice of one lemon When cool, add 1 pint ginger ale. Let set until slightly jelled.
Add	medium can pineapple (drained) 1 cup red and/or white grapes and/or grapefruit sections, orange sections, peach slices, strawberries or blueberries Fold into jello and pour into mold or glass dish

Dressing

Beat	2 tsp flour, ½ cup sugar and 2 eggs
Add	¾ cup drained pineapple juice Mix well and stir constantly until thick
Add	1 ½ tsp melted butter - stir Cool. Fold in two cups of cool whip (or to taste) Note: Do not add fresh pineapple or kiwi.

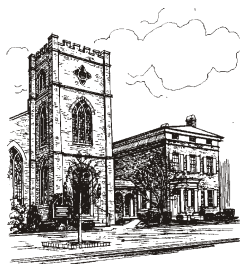
